

A prolific writer in Marathi, Hindi, and English, he was honored with numerous awards, including the Padma Bhushan in 2003. Deeply involved in Gandhian institutions, he remained a lifelong advocate of Gandhian principles, inspiring generations with his wisdom and integrity.
